Senator Cummins, as spokesman for the insurgents, has answered President Taft's plea that the Payne-Aldrich bill, while not perfect, was at least a sincere effort to perform the party's platform pledges.

In his speech at La Crosse, Wis., he said.

'Some men have said we passed a good tariff law. I don't think so. Leaders of the senate and house deliberately repudiated the republican platform and revised the tariff in the interest of the manufacturers and big corporations and not in the interest of the American public. . . . Whenever the American people have opportunity to pass judgment on that tariff bill they will consign the men who made it to eternal infamy."

> Section 1. (Who are electors.) Every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election and of the county, precinct or ward, for the term

clared their intention to become citizens comment, may continue to exercise the right of suffrage until such time as they may have resided in the United States five years after which they shall take out full citizenship papers to be entitled to vote at any succeeding election.

Section 2. (Ballots) That at the general election nineteen hundred and ten (1910) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said pro posed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage, and 'Against said proposed amendment to the

constitution relating to the right of suffrage." Section 3. (Adoption.) If such amendment shall be approved by a majority of all e ectors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute section one (1) of article seven (7) of the constitution of the state of Nebraska.
