W. T. Bullis Dead.

W. T. Bullis an old time resident of Valentine who removed to Sturgis, S. D., a couple of years ago, died last Friday from paralysis. We copy from the Sturgis Record, which speaks briefly of his past life the following obituary:

William Theron Bullis who has been suffering for several weeks at his home in east Sturgis, had a second stroke of paralysis, Friday afternoon and quietly passed away.

He was seventy-two years, two months and six days old. His birthplace was in Niagara county, N. Y., whence he moved to LaSalle county, Ills. He was left with the charge of rearing his six brothers-his parents dying just as he reached young manhood.

He was united in marriage to Elizabeth Zorn, May 16, 1861, who with four of their children, survive his death. Those living are William F., and Charles H., of Valentine, Nebr., Mrs. Nellie Cole, of St. Louis, Mo., and John W., who is a partner with N. A. Bullis, a brother of the deceased in the Hardware & Furniture store at Sturgis. Two children have passed on to the better world, Mrs. Mattie Sawyer and Donna Estelle.

Four of the Bullis brothers did service in the civil war, the deceased serving three years in the 14th infantry, coming home without a scratch, while his next younger brother who was here visiting this summer, had both eyes put out in the first battle.

Mr. Bullis engaged in farming at the close of the war, moving to Hampton, Iowa, thence to Valentine, Neb., where he made his home until moving to Sturgis last spring. All of the children have been at his bedside during his illness, and all but his daughter were present at the funeral which was held in the M. E. church Sunday at 3:30 p. m., Rev. H. L. Case preaching the sermon.

At the conclusion of the service the remains of the deceased were escorted to the cemetery by a squad of the militia commanded by Captain McNenny, the Masonic lodge and G. A. R., in a body, and followed by a large company of sorrowing friends. At the grave the burial services were conducted by the A. F. & A. M., lodge and the G. A. R.

Judge F. M. Walcott of Valentine, Neb., who has been a member for many years, of the home lodge with Mr. Bullis, stepped forward and paid a very fitting tribute and the highest words of encomium to the sterling character and life long integrity of the deceased. Sturgis (S. D.) Record.

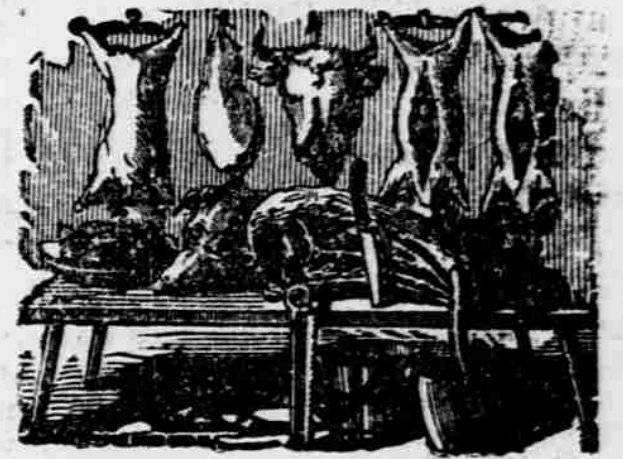
