Seed Corn Condition is a Serious One. Omaha, Nebr., Jan. 14.—"The condition of the seed corn of the state is in even worse condition than at first anticipated," said Prof. C. W. Pugsley of the Nebraska Experiment Station in an address to the Nebraska Farmers Congress at a session held at the South Omaha Live Stock Exchange last Friday.

"We have extended our tests so that seed from more than thirty counties in the state has been examined and we find that the situation is critical," said he. "Unless you farmers test your seed corn and are absolutely sure it will germinate, you are going to be disappointed when the crops are harvested."
