After a lingering illness of sclerosis of the arteries Lou Brownell died last Saturday afternoon at his home in Valentine at the age of about 60 years.

At his request Dr. Caldwell came here to conduct the funeral, which was held at the M. E. church Monday afternoon and the body was taken by his brother-in-law, Mr. Golf, and son, to Denver where he was to be cremated, as the request of the deceased. He wanted simple services only, without music or song, and thus carried out his plan of life to make little ado about himself.

Everybody liked Lou. He came here about 27 years ago and was a faithful clerk in the U. S. land office and one in whom men placed their confidence. He lived the simple life and made his home at the Donohoe hotel for many years where he was always a familiar figure and also upon our streets. Valentine people will miss him most, for here we have learned to revere the quiet unostentatious man who was everyone's friend. Though he entered into discussions of questions his opinions were respected and people never quarreled with him.

About three years ago he bought a home and his sister, Mrs. Wooster, since that time made her home with him and kept the house where in his declining years she was a comfort to him.

He saved up several thousand dollars which was loaned on interest or invested in land.

His early home was at Dowagiac, Mich.

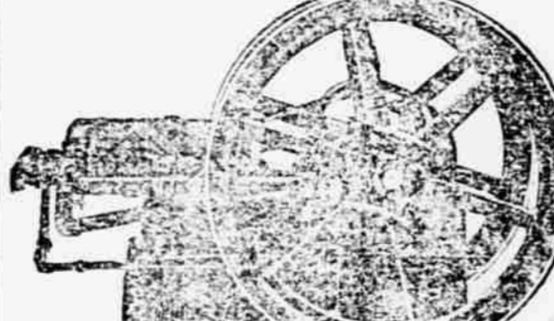
Notice of Hearing on Probate Without Administration.

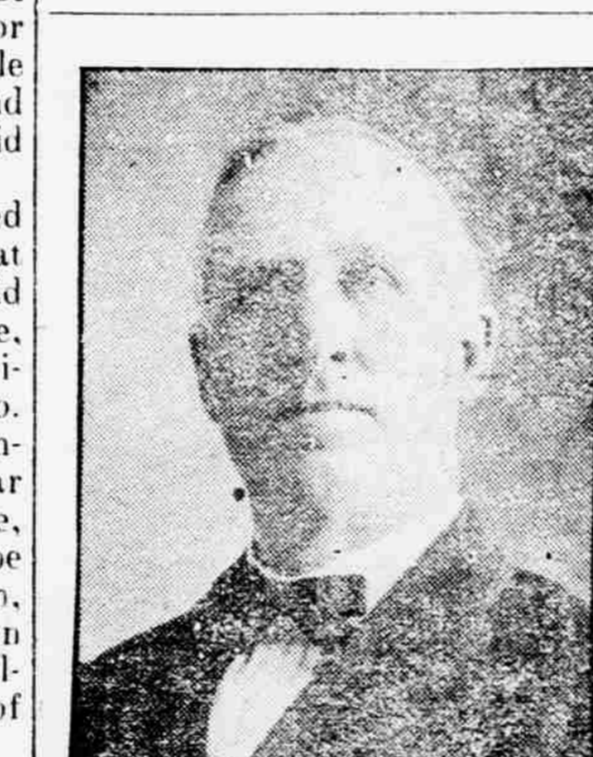

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: The persons whose names to these articles subscribed, and such persons as may hereafter join and abate with the persons signing these articles and their successors, adopt the following articles for the government of the association hereby formed: ARTICLE I. The name of this association shall be the Woman's Improvement Club of Valentine, Nebraska. ARTICLE II. The object of this Association shall be to improve and beautify all public property within the city limits of the City of Valentine, Nebraska, including the parks and cemetery, adjacent to said city, and the betterment of material and moral conditions generally. ARTICLE III. Any woman may become a member of this Association by signing the constitution and paying the membership fee of ten cents. ARTICLE IV. The affairs of the Association shall be governed by a board of nine trustees, and the trustees shall be elected from among their own number by the following officers: President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, and the clerk of this association. The duties of the president, vice president, secretary-treasurer and clerk shall be those usually devolving on such officers, and such other duties as may be fixed by the laws that may hereafter be adopted by the Association. There shall be an annual election held for the election of the board of trustees on the first Thursday in May in each year, beginning with the year 1912. At the election a quorum of three trustees to serve for a term of three years; three trustees to serve for a term of two years; three trustees to serve for a term of one year; and at each annual election after the year 1912 there shall be elected three trustees for a term of three years each. Should any vacancies occur the trustees to have the power to fill the same until the next annual election. ARTICLE V. These articles may be amended at any regular meeting of this association by a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided notice of the intended change be given at three previous consecutive meetings. ARTICLE VI. The trustees herein provided for and their successors in office, shall have the power to sell, convey, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of any real estate owned by the association, and to execute all necessary instruments therefor, and to do all things necessary to carry out the purposes of this Association. ARTICLE VII. A majority of the board of trustees herein provided for shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. ARTICLE VIII. It is understood that any property belonging to the association shall be operated in the interests of the community, without profit to any person firm or corporation, but that all net receipts shall be paid into the treasury of said club for disbursement by it in some public improvement. ARTICLE IX. In case said Woman's Improvement Club shall, for any reason, decide to surrender its property said property shall become the property of the City of Valentine, to be managed by the municipal authorities and disposed of only at a regular election of said municipality, by a majority vote of all votes cast at that election.
