CAPE DUTCH JOIN BOERS

General Dewet's Forces Augmented by the Colonists.

KITCHENER AT THE FRONT.

British Commander-in-Chief to Lead His Forces Against Boer Invaders-Battle In Progress Near De Anr.-British Occupy Britstown Without Opposition.

London, Dec. 26.-The position of Cape Colony is hanging in the balance. According to the Morning Post's Cape Town correspondent everything depends upon the quantity of ammunition in possession of the disloyal Dutch residents, 100 of whom have joined the Boers in the Philiptown district alone. Energetic measures have been taken to stem the invasion, but there is unquestionably danger that parties of Boers will get through into parts of the Colony and gradually raise the whole Cape in rebellion. Reinforcements can arrive none too soon.

Most of the dispatches from Cape Town describe the raiders as doing little harm and as being rapidly enclosed by Lord Kitchener's command. Lord Kitchener is in the heart of the disaffected districts. He has the advantage of being personally acquainted with local conditions. Last March he supervised the suppression of the rising which occurred then. He is bringing down thousands of troops from the north.

The Standard's Cape Town correspondent says the loyalists demand that martial law shall be proclaimed throughout Cape Colony, but adds, "such a step is now impossible owing to the lack of sufficient troops to enforce it."

The correspondent of the Daily Mail at Cape Town says: "The pro-Boer press is singularly quiet. They have been made ureasy by the promptness and thoroughness of the military action, but reports from various parts of the western provinces foreshadow perilous possibilities. A responsible colonist who recently made a tour of the colony declares that 90 per cent of the Dutch are simply waiting for the appearance of a resourceful leader to rebel."

Civil railway traffic has been suspended largely in all parts of the colony and the movements of both the Boers and the British are almost unknown in Cape Town.

It appears that one Boer column attacked Steynsburg, but was replused and fled, entrenching itself in the mountains. Another commando captured a party of police at Venterstadt. Fighting is going on near De Arr.

Particulars are unobtainable. Two hundred Boers have left Britstown after commandeering all supplies

London, Dec. 26 .- Lord Kitchener, *elegraphing to the war office, under ite of Naauwpoort, Dec. 24, reports. "Thornycroft's mounted infantry have occupied Britstown without opposition. The Boess retired to the north in the direction of Prieska. They will be followed up."

Key West Talks With Havana. Key West, Fla., Dec. 26.-An interesting experiment has just been made here. In the presence of several prominent persons the officers of a well known telephone company connected the wires here and at Havana with the gulf cable between the two cities. For a few minutes a roaring noise prevented any communication, but finally this subsided and the officials heard from Havana distinctly the words "I cannot understand you" clearly transmitted. Havana, however, failed to clearly understand. The experiment was regarded as highly

successful.

Many Desire Peace. Manila, Dec. 26.-Advices from the island of Leyte show that while the east coast is quiet, the west coast is in a state of turmoil. Lieutenant French and three men of the Forty-fourth volunteers were wounded near Ilongas. An address from the new federal party has been published, stating that the number of Filipinos who really desire peace is growing daily, and that the object of the party is to unite all Filipinos who really desire to work operation by Feb. 26. for peace.

Many Shipping Disasters.

Port Townsend, Wash., Dec. 26 .-Each tugboat arriving from Cape Flattery brings fresh news of marine disasters along the coast, and when full returns are in the damage by the recent succession of gales will be the largest in the history of shipping along the Pacific coast. The German ship Carl, wheat laden, was towed to Port Angeles today by the tug Boyden in a waterlogged condition.

Heavy Dumage to Shipping on North Paeific Coast During Recent Storm. Several Vessels Ashore.

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 24. Details are coming in of shipping disasters on the north Pacific coast during recent storms. The American bark Highland Light, Captain MacClure, was wrecked three days ago on the shores of Barclay's sound, Vancouver Island. Heavy gales dismasted her, tore away her bulwarks and carried away her lifeboats. In this condition she drifted ashore. Her crew escaped. The storm played havoe at Astoria, where the French bark General Millenet was stranded on a sandy shore. The steamer Oswego was swamped at her
