## PEACE MISSION A FAILURE

Will Try to Reach Steel Corporation Through Hanna.

NO CHANGE IN STRIKE STATUS.

Shaffer Satisfied With Conditions at Wellsville-Says He Is Right, Notwithstanding Criticisms of Other Labor Leaders.

Pittsburg, July 26 .- The peace misgion of M. M. Garland, who went to New York in behalf of the conservative element in the Amalgamated association, has failed. Mr. Garland was unable to secure from the steel manufacturers any terms on which a settlement could be reached. They would not recede on inch from the attitude they have taken, holding that the workers' leaders precipitated the fight and peace negotiations are off. At the same time a more powerful influence is being sought to carry the olive branch to J. P. Morgan. Joseph Bishop, secretary of the Ohio state board of arbitration, is working as mediator, and plans, it is understood, to reach the combine: people through Senator Hanna. President Shaffer of the Amalgamated association was in a more hopeful mood yesterday than he has been for some time. He declared he was perfectly satisfied with his inspection of conditions in Wellsville and apprehended no difficulty in keeping his men in line at that place. President Shaffer evinced no surprise when mention was made of the criticism that had been offered by other labor leaders regarding his bringing on this battle at this time. He said that he expected criticism from many people, but it did not alter his position nor the conviction he held that he was perfectly right. During the afternoon Organizer Flynn of the American Federation of Labor was a caller at the offices of the Amalgamated association. He held a lengthy conversation with President Shaffer and set at rest all stories to the effect that the Federation was not in sympathy with the Amalgamated association, by saying that the entire organization was ready and waiting to assist the Amalgamated association, both financially and morally, in this strike whenever assistance was asked. No change has taken place at Wells-

ville. No new men were imported and the mills are still at work. Information from McKeesport leads to the belief that the big mill of the National Tube company in that city would shortly be involved in the

strike.

Machinists Give Up Fight. Scranton, Pa., July 26 .- The Allis-Chalmers company resumed work in all departments of its Scranton machine shops yesterday, the strike of nine weeks' duration for a nine-hour working day without reduction in wages having failed. Over 1,200 men returned to work. Three hundred men also returned to work at Finch's foundry and machine shops and at the Brooks and McClane works. No concessions were made.

SHOWERS IN CORN BELT.

Light Precipitation In Iowa, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Washington, July -26.-Official rec ports show that the corn belt region continues hot and dry with no prospects of immediate change in these conditions. Showers have fallen in the northern half of the corn belt area, including eastern Nebraska, Iowa, northern Illinois, northern Indiana and Ohio. Yesterday there were some light rainfalls in western Nebraska and Oklahoma. These precipitations, however, the forecast officials say, are not always conducive to the best results to the growing crops, as they are mostly thunder showers, immediately followed by a hot sun. Showers, it is said, possibly may occur in the drought stricken region today, as they usually are inseparable from visitations of intense heat, but no general occurrence of them is predicted. Temperatures in the corn belt, while a few degrees lower than Wednesday, were again high, ranging from 95 degrees to 100 degrees and higher.

Lincoln Holds High Mark.

Lincoln, July 26,-Except in the northeast section of the state, where a heavy shower was reported last night at Niobrara. Nebraska had little rain yesterday. The temperature in the southern half was almost up to the record stage, the maximum for Lincoln being 104.7. There were two prostrations in this city. Otto A. Schoenrop, a Union Pacific passenger from Cleveland, to Portland, Or., was prostrated by heat at Columbus, Neb., and taken to the hospital, where he died.

Heat Somewhat Modified.

Topeka, July 26.—The temperatures were not quite so high in Kansas yesterday, averaging about 100 for the entire state. However, not the least relief has been experienced from the drought. The atmosphere has been very humid and numerous prostrations are reported from various parts of the state. The corn crop is in a worse condition than ever and it will be a surprising thing if one-third of a crop is obtained.
