That conference was the one that broke up in the Hotel Lincoln three weeks ago last Sunday. In order to be equally fair to the other constituent companies of the United States Steel corporation and accord them the same treatment, President Shaffer has sent a similar notice to the officers of the Federal Steel company, the National Steel company and the National Tube company, giving them the same time in which to make any effort they may desire to bring about a settlement or he will put in force this same clause in the Amalgamated association's constitution. It is presumed that delay in issuing the general order will be at least until the end of the present week. Possibly it will not be issued until early next week. In the meantime the men in the mills of these three companies will be prepared to come out when the strike order is is-

the strike is based in the bare hope that the officials of the three additional companies will bring to bear sufficient influence to urge an adjustment of the difficulty before the strike order is issued.

The condition at McKeesport is reported as follows: Many strikers are on the streets around the National Tube works. The men ar nounce that they are only waiting for orders from headquarters before going out. Organizer Flynn of the Federation of Labor was here yesterday looking over the situation and conferring with local leaders. Persistent rumors are to the effect that the mine workers will refuse to furnish coal for the trust coke furnaces or mills.

NOT SURE OF POSITION YET. Attitude of Federation of Labor Will

Depend Upon Developments. Washington, Aug. 6.—Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, who has charge of the headquarters here in the absence of President Gompers in Philadelphia, said yesterday that it was impossible to forecast what the organizations affiliated with the federation may do to assist the strike of the Amalgamated association men. "If the antagonism of the trust reaches such proportions that the American Federation of Labor is forced to come in and protect the recognized rights of organized labor," continued Mr. Morrison, "President Gompers undoubtedly will call the executive council of the federation together to take all measures necessary. The affiliated organizations of the Amalgamated association have the right to call ou the federation for moral and financial assistance."

Bowling Green, O., Aug. 6.-A terrific explosion of nitro-glycerine occurred on the Munn road near this city yesterday, in which one man, William Redbaugh, a driver for the Hercules Torpedo company, was blown to atoms and many others narrowly escaped serious injury. Redbaugh was driving a wagon loaded with 800 quarts of the explosive and when nearing the tracks of the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton road whipped up his horses to cross the tracks ahead of an approaching passenger train. The jolting exploded the stuff on the tracks and the train was stopped within a few feet of the gaping hole made by the explosion.
