At the special meeting of Norfolk camp No. 492, Modern Woodmen of America, held last evening, it was decided to accept the invitation of the business men to hold the district picnic of the fraternity here, provided the required amount of funds can be raised. There are many Woodmen in this section of the state and it is figured that a district pienic with good attractions would induce a large crowd of people to come and stay through the three days. It was decided as soon as the event becomes assured to extend an invitiation to C. W. Hawes, head consul of the order, to be present. He is said to be a fluent speaker and many members of the order would come for the sole purpose of making his acquaintance. It is expected that one day of the fair would be especially given up to the Woodmen, who would have a parade and have charge of the whole program for that day. A plot of shaded ground would be provided where those who desire to camp out could pitch their tents.

The attractions of the other days would be ball games, horse and bicycle races, and kindered events. The soliciting committee will do no

more until a meeting of the Commercial club is held, which will be some time early next week, when it will be finally determined whether the fair shall be undertaken.
