islature of the State of Nebraska: SECTION 1. That section one of Ar-ticle fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska beamended to read as follows:

Section 1. Either branch of the legislature may propose amendments to this Constitution, and if the same be agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected Chleago. 
