

AN ENTHUSIASTIC MEETING

Norfolk People Move for the Rebuilding of the Hospital.

COMMITTEES ARE SELECTED

Work of Presenting the Matter to the State Legislature Will be at Once Undertaken—Names of Members of that Body.

The meeting of the Commercial club last evening at the city hall was one of the best attended public gatherings of the kind ever held in the city.

G. A. Luikart, president of the club, presided over the meeting, and in the absence of M. C. Hazen, his place as secretary was temporarily filled by W. N. Huse.

The chairman stated that the object of the meeting was to inaugurate a movement toward the rebuilding of the Norfolk hospital.

It was recognized by the meeting that the committee would need considerable money to pay traveling expenses, postage and other legitimate and necessary expenses, and a committee of two, M. C. Hazen and H. W. Winter, was appointed to act with the treasurer, C. C. Gow, to collect the membership fee from those who now belong to the Commercial club and have not paid, solicit other members, and to collect such further funds as may be found necessary to carry on the work.

While the rebuilding of the hospital is of local interest in Norfolk and the city should bear the burden of the expense and work, it is confidently believed that all north Nebraska will contribute toward the end sought.
