

TO SETTLE ALASKAN LINE.

Boundary Commission Met This Morning in London.

DISPUTE OF LONG STANDING.

History of the Case Which Has Caused Trouble Between Britain and the United States for Many Years.

London, Sept. 3.—Special to The News: The commission appointed under the treaty concluded last January between Great Britain and the United States to settle if possible the long-standing dispute over the Alaskan boundary met this morning at the British foreign office and formally organized.

The Alaskan boundary dispute is one of long standing. Since 1872 Canada has been calling attention to the question year after year.

The territory in dispute covers an area of upward of 20,000 square miles. For the most part it is mountainous, but it includes valuable gold mines.

Throughout almost its entire length the disputed territory adjoins British Columbia on the west side. The remaining portion in dispute adjoins the famous Yukon territory, and includes the eastern boundary of the coast-strip from the vicinity of Kukatat bar to the one hundred and forty-first meridian.

TO FIX EXPORT RATES ON FLOUR

Japs Seize Steamer.

London, Sept. 3.—The Tien Tsin correspondent of the Standard telegraphs the report that the Stanley Dollar has been seized by a Japanese man-of-war, because it did not have the permission of Korea to trade in lumber.

REPORT IS DENIED.

Uprising Not on at Manistritz—Thousands of People Confronted by Famine.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 3.—The insurgents in the district of Adrianople appear to be less active. The Turks are mourning in an overwhelming force and the revolutionists are taking refuge in the mountains.

The report published by the Dnevnik of a general uprising in northern Macedonia is denied both in official and revolutionary circles.

It is reported that the Turkish commanders are adopting Lord Kitchener's tactics in the Transval by making lives in the Kilikias district and elsewhere with the idea of destroying or driving the insurgent bands over the Bulgarian frontier.

New York, Sept. 3.—The fraternal Order of Eagles held their parade before going into session to continue their convention at Tammany Hall.

Silver Coins for Philippines.

Philadelphia, Sept. 3.—Under escort of a strong guard 10,465,999 silver coins, aggregating \$28,650, were shipped from the United States mint to New York, where they will be placed on board a steamship and taken to Manila.

Pennsylvania Democrats Name Ticket.

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 3.—The Democratic state convention nominated the following ticket by acclamation: Auditor, Senator Arthur G. Dewalt of Lehigh county; state treasurer, Senator Joel G. TWENTY-NINE LIVES LOST

Explosion on Austrian Steamer Kills Captain and Crew.

WORK OF THE REVOLUTIONISTS.

Black Sea Vessel Catches Fire and Has to Be Beached—Belgrade Hears That Town of Adrianople Has Been Blown Up and is Burning.

Constantinople, Sept. 3.—Three explosions occurred on the Austrian steamer Vaskapu soon after leaving the Bulgarian port of Burgas, en route for Constantinople, by which twenty-nine persons perished.

The vessel caught fire and had to be beached. A telegram conveying this news was received by the agent here of the Hungarian Levant line, to which the vessel belongs.

The port has sent a note to the foreign embassies and legations informing them that according to police information the Bulgarian agitators are projecting outrages against the embassies, legations and other public buildings in Constantinople.

London, Sept. 3.—Special dispatches from Constantinople published here describe the destruction of the steamer Vaskapu as a revolutionary outrage. They state that the bomb was timed to burst while the steamer was off Constantinople, but owing to the vessel being twenty hours late in starting from Varna, the explosion occurred off Misirova bay.

Adrianople in Flames.

Vienna, Sept. 3.—The Belgrade papers are again spreading sensational rumors that a portion of the town of Adrianople has been blown up and that the other part is burning.

Drainage Tunnel Completed.

Cripple Creek, Colo., Sept. 3.—The drainage tunnel that will unwater many of the principal mines of the camp below their present lowest workings, has been completed.

Deputy Sheriff Assassinated.

Eldorado, Ark., Sept. 3.—Dallas Hunter, a deputy sheriff of this county, was assassinated about four miles west of town, while on the road from his home to Eldorado.

Marshalltown, Ia., Sept. 3.—The arrest of F. E. Myers, alias Marson, at Muscatine, has caused a sensation here.
