DOINGS OF CITY COUNCIL.

Fail to Affirm Appointments of Street Commissioner.

CONDEMN SOME SIDEWALKS.

Attorney Ordered to Prepare Law Against the Driving of Cattle on the Streets.—Commissioner Matter Left in Hands of Committee.

The Norfolk city council met in regular session last night with the mayor and all the councilmen present except Spellman and Walker.

The street and alley committee reported that in accordance with instructions from the council the contract for the construction of the Park avenue ditch with C. E. Shipley had been signed and that Mr. Shipley had commenced the preliminary work. The committee also reported that August Bathke had refused to accept the office of street commissioner.

The mayor then nominated Wm. Beswick for street commissioner, but on vote of the council the nomination failed of confirmation. H. H. Miller was then named for the position, but the required number of councilmen failing to vote for the nominee Miller was not appointed.

The public works committee was authorized to purchase two cars of coal for the pumping station from the Salter Coal and Grain company.

The nuisance committee reported some minor complaints but considered no action necessary at this time.

Mr. Brummond reported leaks in the water mains on Madison and Pasewalk avenues and suggested that they be looked after and repaired.

The mayor reported that he had appointed W. H. Law as nuisance inspector, he to do the work without cost to the city.

The treasurer's report for September was read, showing the following balances on hand: General fund, \$85.82; interest fund, \$1,015.83; water fund, \$1,159.38; road fund, \$5.59; insurance company tax, \$195; street light fund, \$64.55, and the report was referred to the auditing committee.

City Engineer W. H. Lowe reported on the grade on North Seventh street, with reference to draining off the water on the street in that direction, which report was ordered filed.

H. E. Hardy requested permission to move his scales from North Fourth street to North Fifth street, which request was granted by vote of the council.

The bill of E. E. Hartman for \$22.50, assigned to the Citizens National bank, was laid over until the next meeting.

The bill of John Krantz which had laid over from last month, was taken up and allowed.

By unanimous consent of the council the chief of police was instructed to see that theatrical companies showing in the city hereafter, pay the license provided by ordinance.

Mr. Wilkinson of the street and alley committee, reported sidewalks, condemned to be rebuilt and repaired, and the following resolution was presented and adopted, covering the points presented:

"Resolved, That the sidewalk along the south end of lot 3, block 2, Koenigstein's addition to Norfolk, be condemned and the owner be required to rebuild the same in thirty days. And also

"Resolved, That the sidewalks along the following described lots, to-wit: Original town, east half of lot 9, block 5; south end of lot 15, block 6; lot 3, block 3; lot 10, block 4; Mathewson's addition, lot 8, block 1; lots 9 and 10, block 1; lots 11 and 14, block 2; lots 1, 15 and 16, block 3; lot 3, block 1; Burrow's second addition, lot 8, block 1; Koenigstein's addition, lots 3 and 4, block 2; lots 9 and 10,

The council adjourned.
