

# FIREMEN GO TO PIERCE

### RUNNING TEAM WILL BE THERE JULY 14.

### ADVERTISING MEN WILL LEAVE

Determined to send delegates all over Nebraska—Kern to Bonesteel, McFarland to O'Neill and Wayne Hartford South of Norfolk.

The executive committee of the state firemen's tournament met at the city hall last night and finished up a good lot of business in a short space of time.

Among other things, the committee determined to send men out all over the state of Nebraska and into South Dakota for the purpose of advertising the tourney; and decided to accept the cordial invitation of the Pierce department which would have the Norfolk running team to be present at the grand Army of the Republic encampment (June 14, the last of a three day's session).

A committee of three was appointed to make trips and advertise the tournament. Their expenses and wages will be paid by the committee.

**Kern to Bonesteel.**  
Chief Kern will make the trip next Monday to Bonesteel and will visit all of the Incorporated towns. He will pay visits to Pierce, Platteville, Creighton, Verdigre, Nebraska, Spencer, Lynch, Anoka, Fairfax, Erie, Verdel, Winsted, Monow, Bristol, Foster, Hadar and Bonesteel. In some of these towns there are rattling good runners and they all ought to be at the tourney. Some of the towns have brand new uniforms and will probably take prizes when it comes to the dress parade stunt.

**West to O'Neill.**  
City Clerk S. R. McFarland will make the trip west to O'Neill, stopping at intermediate points. On his journey he will visit Battle Creek, Meador Grove, Tilden, Oakdale, Neigh, Clearwater, Esling, Inman, and O'Neill.

**Northwest to Wayne.**  
Mr. McFarland will also make the trip northwest to Wayne, covering Hoshins, Winsho, Wayne, Hartington, Kinsolp, Bloomfield and a number of other points.

**Stanton, Madison and Humphrey.**  
Ex-Chief Hartford will be the man who visits Madison, Humphrey, Platte Center, Columbus, Grand Island, Hastings and all other cities south. Returning, he will wind up his trip at Fremont and will take in West Point, Reemer, Wisner, Pilger and last but not least, the home of last year's prize winners—the pride of north Nebraska as the speediest stoppers in the golden rod state—Stanton.

**Concessions Differently.**  
Concessions will be managed differently this year from the methods of last season. Last year they were run on a percentage basis—this year the department will charge so much at the outset for the various concessions. A number of letters from prospective concessionaires were received and reported favorably to the proposition.

The committee then adjourned to meet again Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.  
As luck would have it, the president, Verus Neno, and a majority of the department were present. So they just called another meeting right there and did some more business.

**Will go to Pierce.**  
A letter was read from the Pierce firemen inviting the Norfolk running team to come up to Pierce on July 14, the last of a trio of big days there, and to help close the doings of the Grand Army of the Republic encampment. By a unanimous and a hearty vote, the boys decided to accept the invitation and will be on hand.

**West Side Hose Men.**  
The West Side Hose company held a meeting. President Jonas called them to order and a good crowd answered roll call. The boys want uniforms and an effort will be made to persuade the city council to assist.

**Recover Pony.**  
The pony reported to have been stolen from near Hadar, was recovered yesterday. The little animal was a gentle one with his owners, but none too obedient for strangers and it is supposed that the thieves could not handle him and turned him loose. It is supposed that the four other animals were hurried to the Rosebud reservation, as the time for doing that sort of business is growing short and those who have profited by it so long will only have a few more chances of using the reservation for a dumping ground for horses and cattle if legally obtained.

## NEBRASKA STOCK AT ST. LOUIS

### State Improved Live Stock Association Has \$2,000 to Pay Freight to the Exposition.

The Nebraska commission to the St. Louis exposition has placed at the disposal of the Nebraska Improved Live Stock association, the sum of \$2,000 to pay transportation charges on Nebraska live stock to the St. Louis exposition, the money to be divided as follows:

For horses \$400, for swine \$400, or sheep, \$200, for cattle \$1,000.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the live stock association it was decided that all live stock to participate in this offer of free transportation must be exhibited at the Nebraska state fair, excepting horses, which must be shown before the state fair. All horsemen who wish to take advantage of this offer must notify the secretary, O. E. Mickey, at Osceola, Neb., prior to July 1, 1904, and must be filed with the secretary by that date or be barred from partial participation in free transportation.

If enough entries are filed to warrant it, a committee will be sent to examine entries and pass upon their merits. All other live stock will be chosen from stock exhibited at the Nebraska state fair and all animals given free transportation must be owned in the state by residents of Nebraska.

Exhibitors are requested to notify the secretary of the number of head to be exhibited, stating breed, age, sex, name and number of animals, and class in which they will be entered. Entry blanks will be supplied by O. E. Mickey, secretary, or by the department of live stock at St. Louis. Entries must be made at St. Louis after August 18, and their exhibition will begin August 22, and close September 2, 1904.

Entries for cattle must be filed on or before July 29, at St. Louis, and will be received from September 8, and exhibition will begin September 12, and close September 24.  
Sheep and swine must be entered on or before August 29; will be received on September 29, and the exhibition will begin October 3, and close October 15, 1904.

All entries sent to the secretary will have prompt attention and it is earnestly wished that all parties who enter, or have entered, directly to exhibition authorities will also send full particulars of their entries to the secretary. The revised "entry list" and "prize list" is now ready and may be obtained of the chief of the live stock department at St. Louis.

## PICKLED HUMAN HEAD.

### Growsome Relic of Barbaric Chief to be Seen at World's Fair.

St. Louis, June 15.—The head of a South American tribal chieftain, cut off and preserved by his conqueror, a neighboring barbarian king, is a growsome but interesting exhibit in the Brazilian section of the world's fair. The head is a part of a collection of relics of the native tribes of Brazil.

After being cut off, the head was treated after the custom in such cases by having all the facial and skull bones removed. It was then put through a process of curing that hardens the flesh and preserves the original color. As a result the head is practically unchanged, except in size. The process reduces the size and the once-savage chieftain's head now appears about the size of a fist. A luxuriant growth of hair of more than a foot in length is appended to the diminutive relic, the features of which are perfectly preserved. The mustache and beard are also perfect.

The specimen was secured from the warrior who decapitated it in the interior of South America and is the only relic of its nature on exhibition anywhere.

# LAD KILLS YOUNG BROTHER

### SMALL BOY AT CREIGHTON SHOT WITH RIFLE.

### THEY WERE PLAYING TOGETHER

Little Charles Fullerton, Six Years Old, Receives Bullet in Temple and Succumbs Three Hours Afterward.

Creighton, Neb., June 15.—Special to The News: Little Charles Fullerton, a 6-year-old stepson of George Goodwin of this city, was accidentally shot and killed at 5 o'clock last evening, dying within three hours from the effect of a bullet which lodged in his temple from the barrel of a 22-caliber rifle, fired by his brother, John, nine years old.

In Own Home.  
John and Charles Fullerton were playing together happily in the yard at the home in Creighton during the afternoon. At 5 o'clock their mother, Mrs. Goodwin, called the kids in on account of the rain which had begun to fall. Behind the front door was a little 22-caliber rifle. John, the older boy—a lad of but nine years—took down the gun and lay on playing with it.

With the barrel pointed at his young brother's head, the tiny trigger suddenly snapped and a little ball of lead whirled through the blind channel, struck the brother's right temple and sunk deep into the head.

**Succumbs to the Wound.**  
Doctors were immediately summoned and everything possible to avert a fatal result was done to save the little fellow's life. Human skill was powerless, however, and three hours afterward—three hours after the two brothers had been laughing and playing together—his life expired.

George Goodwin is in the employ of S. O. Campbell, a real estate dealer of Creighton, and was in Madison when the tragic accident occurred. He was telegraphed last night and left for home in time to arrive this afternoon. The funeral can not, probably, be held before tomorrow afternoon.

Creighton still feels the effect of the keen shock in so sad an occurrence.

The mother is nearly prostrated with grief. She stood in the home when her little son fell.
