MADISON COUNTY RETURNS

PARKER CARRIED TWO OF THE VOTING PRECINCTS.

LIGHT VOTE ON THE AMENDMENT

Bryan, Allen and Robertson Received Votes as Preference for United States Senator—Green Garden and Schoolcraft Firmer than Missouri.

The official returns of the Madison county vote at the election last Tuesday are herewith presented, and some remarkable pluralities are shown. A remarkable feature of the table is the fact that but two precincts in the county gave the Parker electors a plurality and they were Green Garden and Schoolcraft. The majority for the presidential electors, however, reached the magnificent figure of 1,161.

Two precincts, Union and Schoolcraft, reported no votes for preference for United States senator. Mr. Burkett's majority was 1782. There were 44 votes cast for W. J. Bryan, four for W. V. Allen and two for W. M. Robertson for this honor.

The vote was light on the constitutional amendment, less than a quarter of the voters expressing themselves one way or the other on this question. Of those who did vote there was a majority of 285 in favor of the amendment.

Of the pluralities on the state ticket Governor Mickey received the smallest, 295, and J. L. McBrien, for superintendent of public instruction, the largest, 644.

Jack Koenigstein, running without opposition for county attorney, getting better than his party vote, receiving forty-seven more votes than the republican presidential electors.

Williams for state senator ran a little behind the average on the state ticket but received 555 as his plurality, which must be very satisfactory. F. W. Richardson, for state representative received the same plurality as McBrien, being the highest vote on the state ticket, and Johnny Harding for county commissioner eclipsed everything but the presidential electors in his plurality, getting 701 votes more than his opponent, Mr. Mahoney.

J. J. McCarthy was heartily endorsed for congress, receiving a majority of 458 over Mr. McKillip.

The Fourth ward of Norfolk has the credit for being the banner socialist precinct, more votes being recorded for that ticket in the one ward than in all the balance of the county.

TWO DEATHS OF TYPHOID FEVER

[From Wednesday's Daily.]

Bride of Four Weeks and a Little Girl Died This Morning. Mrs. Emma Leu, the young wife of Ferdinand Leu, died at 12:30 this morning at the Leu home six miles northeast of the city, of typhoid fever, and the funeral will be held Friday, at 12 o'clock from the family home and at 2 o'clock from the Christ Lutheran church. Interment will be in the new Lutheran cemetery on North Eleventh street.

Particular interest attaches to this death from the fact that Mrs. Leu was but eighteen years of age and had been married but four weeks, leaving a young husband to mourn her untimely death. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Winter and besides the parents and two sisters to mourn her loss. But a brief month ago Ferdinand Leu and Emma Winter were pronounced one in the St. Paul Lutheran church north of the city and Friday the young bride will be laid in her grave. The young couple had been making their home with the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Leu, since the marriage, and it was there that her death occurred this morning. The sympathy of friends will go out to the young husband and the two bereaved families.

Minnie Heckman. Minnie, the 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gottlieb Heckman, died at the home of her parents on East Phillip avenue, this morning at 5 o'clock of typhoid fever. The little girl had recently given evidence of improvement, but failed suddenly yesterday and last night until death resulted this morning.

The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

FAREWELL TO BOOTH-TUCKER

Salvationists Give a Demonstration to Their Departing Commander. New York, Nov. 16.—The White Star line pier was the scene of a notable demonstration today on the departure of the steamship Oceanic.
