Sick people were constantly, the Omaha physician said, keeping away from their beds when rest would ward off serious illness or serve to lessen its effects. All functions of the body are related to the nerves and when the body is being rebuilt one's vitality must not be exhausted. People threatened with ill health who take to their sick bed at once obtain: muscle activity reduced mental quiet, avoidance of shaking up, and other conditions favorable to a rapid recovery before the disease is far advanced.
