

Horse's Kick Cripples Glover.

Lead, S. D., Feb. 13 .- From the kick of a horse received over a week ago, George W. Glover, son of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, the Christian Science leader, is suffering from paralysis of one leg that threatens to become permanent. The horse kicked Glover on the right leg and reopened an old gunshot wound received in the civil war. Since then Glover has lost the use of the limb, and surgeons fear he will never regain it.

Negro Whipped by Kansas Mob. Salina, Kan., Feb. 13 .-- George Washington, a negro, charged with a brutal assault on his wife, was taken from the jail at Ellsworth by a mob of 100 masked men and threatened with hanging. He was released after a horsewhipping was administered to him and as he was leaving town he was shot in the shoulder by a member of the mob.
