"Seeds seem in some congressional quarters to be held in disrepute," observed Senator Allen of Madison the other day, discussing the efforts of Congressman Pollard and others to amputate the free seed distribution of the government, "but I must confess. a friendly feeling for the government's gift package. It is really about the only connection that exists between the average man and his government, this little package of garden and flower seed.
