An Ordinance Granting Permission and Authority to the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, Its Successors and Assigns, to Locate, Construct, Maintain and Operate one (1) Standard Gauge Railroad Track Upon, Over and Across Philip Avenue, Near the Center Line of Block Four (4) and nine (9), Between Sixth and Seventh Streets, and Upon, Over and Across the Alley Running East and West Through Said Block Four (4) in the City of Norfolk, Nebraska, and Prescribing the Conditions Upon Which Said Rights Are Granted.

Order of the City of Norfolk, Nebraska.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Norfolk, Nebraska: Section 1. That there be and is hereby granted to the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, its successors and assigns, the right, privilege and authority to locate, construct, maintain and operate one (1) standard gauge railroad track upon, over and across Philip Avenue, near the center line of blocks four (4) and nine (9) between Sixth and Seventh streets, and upon, over and across the alley running east and west through said block four (4) in the city of Norfolk, Nebraska, being an extension of the present eastern track of said railway company in said block nine (9) now terminating at the south line of said Philip Avenue.
