Eleven Servians are Deported.

Philadelphia, Feb. 7.—Acting on a decision of Judge J. B. McPherson in the United States district court, immigration officials are preparing to deport eleven Servians who arrived in this port, bound for Gary, Ind., where they intended to seek work in the steel mills. The immigration officials decided to deport the Servians on the ground that they might become public charges. The officials claimed that an investigation of labor conditions at Gary showed that more than a thousand men were out of work at that place. Counsel for the Servians instituted process for their release, but Judge McPherson in his decision upheld the ruling of the immigration officials.
