Count Sonnino was called to order, and with his colleague, Marquis Comar, would have retired but for the intervention of other delegates, who, by conciliatory speeches, prevented a break in the international body.

London, Oct. 5.—The Daily Mail's Saloniki correspondent says that negotiations with Germany have proved fruitless, and the government is now turning to Great Britain in quest of nodus vivendi satisfactory to Turkey's honor. The committee of union and progress approves the new cabinet, but if negotiations with the British government fail, the ministry displays any signs of yielding to Italy, the committee will overturn the cabinet and the chamber.

First Theft of Land Rush.

Notwithstanding the extraordinary precautions taken by the Northwestern railway to guarantee against the work of thieves and rascals, the roadmaster's car, standing near the roundhouse on the south side, was broken into yesterday afternoon and \$17 in money was stolen. This is the first theft reported at the police station since the beginning of the land rush.

Three Grifters Here.

According to the Norfolk police three "chums" men, well dressed and wearing diamonds, are being shadowed in this city. These men, say the police, make it a habit of getting on the cars on the south side and riding to the city. The Norfolk police force has been strengthened on the south side. Mike Kennedy continues his duties at night and Ernest Sasse has been appointed to the night work in the city. Patrolman Livingston has been put on the day force and George Wheeler takes his place during the night. The special detectives employed by the railroad company are numerous on trains here. Special Agent Peter Jolly returned from a trip to Gregory and will remain here for a few days.

Has He Authority?

In the eyes of City Attorney H. P. Barnhart and Police Judge C. E. Elsey, Robert Batlike is not a special policeman. Chief of Police Marquardt takes the same stand in the matter and has told Batlike that he will not be permitted to make arrests officially from now on. Batlike, according to Chief Marquardt, is receiving a salary from proprietors of resorts east of town and for this salary he is to maintain peace and order in that district. Monday night he arrested a man and took from him a revolver which was now in the police station. During the night the prisoner was turned loose because Chief Marquardt says the special officer had changed his mind.

Taft Disagrees With Them.

Denver, Oct. 4.—In a speech to the public lands convention here President Taft flatly disagreed with the sentiment of that convention in regard to the leasing of public lands by the federal government expressed in resolutions. The president declared that the west needed capital to develop its public lands and said that only through a federal leasing system could such capital be induced to come west.
