# WALSH FORTUNE SHRINKS.

#### Late Banker's \$27,000,000 Reduced to \$125,000.

Chicago, Nov. 10 .- Not more than \$125,000 is expected to be left out of the estate of the late John R. Walsh, according to information given out preceding the filing of the late financier's will. The widow and five children, Richard W. and John W. Walsh, Mrs. L. Blake Baldwin, Mrs. Orville Babcock and Miss Mary Walsh, will be the sole beneficiarles.

This advance information confirms the former banker's statements made at the time of settlement of his \$7, 000,000 note given to the Chicago Clearing House association when the latter took over the three Walsh banks at the time of their founder's arrest.

The Walsh fortune, once estimated at \$27,000,000, was reduced largely by loss of the banks, and in the settlement of the big note referred to Walsh put over \$14,000,000 in securities, which, he said at the time, practically wiped out his fortune.
