Sec-Ex-Senator Allen describes as a "polit- tion 1246 of the postal laws and regulations provides that at money order offices not limited, and all larger offices are of this class, that a money order may be drawn upon the office at which it is issued and the order can then be held by the purchaser for one year. It is available to cash in at any time or may be assigned and drawn by the party to whom it is transferred. Under this rule the money order system provides a savings bank for a length of time, one year or less, and at the end of a year, if savings are not drawn out, a new order can be secured. While the government pays no interest it offers absolute safety, for f orders become lost duplicates can be secured without extra cost.—State Jour-

New York, March 29. - A dispatch to the Journal, dated Manila, Wednesday, says: Bocave has been taken by our troops. The railroad bridge is uninjured. General MacArthur is now within eight miles of Malolos.

NEW YORK, March 29 .- A dispatch to the Herald from Manila says the insurgent capital has been moved from Ma-Pinas, south of Manila, Tuesday noon.


