BUILDING ALSO BADLY DAMAGED.

Started Between 2 and 3 O'clock this Morning - Loss Partially Covered by Insurance - Origin of the Blaze a Mystery. Start Made in the Basement.

The sea-lion whistle at the water-works awoke Norfolk citizens shortly before 3 o'clock this morning with its dismal fire alarm, and it was not long until the fire department and a large number of citizens were on the streets.

The blaze was located in the basement of the Rome Miller block, between Fourth and Fifth streets, the lower floor of which was occupied by Miss Ada Wareham's millinery parlors.

By the time the hose companies arrived the fire had not made great headway upstairs and some claim that a few buckets of water would have subdued the blaze without turning the hose loose...

The damage to the building is several hundred dollars, but is fully covered by insurance.
