

COLUMBIA'S GEAR A WRECK A Defect In Her Rigging Proves Nearly

Fatal to the Yacht. NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 3.-An accident to the Columbia marred what promised to be a thorough test to the relative speed of that boat and the Defender in a fine topsail breeze yesterday and the new boat was towed to her builder's works at Bristol, a total wreck above decks. Her new steel main mast bent double just about midway between the deck and the masthead, and all that remained of her magnificent spread of canvas and specially made rigging was

the mast a tangled mass. The damage occurred half an hour after the new and old defenders started on the beat out to the flag boat, off the north end of Block island. The Columbia was fairly tearing through the water, when there was a sound of breaking spars and in an instant the topmast went crashing to leeward, carrying with it the fine new club topsail and small jib topsail. The steel mainmast at once buckled in the middle and down came the upper end of the spar, and the huge mainsail dropped into the water. Fortunately all hands escaped injury. 
