

It was erected at a cost of \$2,400, besides \$99.75 freight on two cannon which were contributed by the government and shipped from Fort Benicia, Cal. These cannon are set on pedestals each side of the monument. The monument proper is 30 feet high ; the heaviest stone weighs about 16,000 pounds and is 9 by 9 feet in dimensions. The stone column is surmounted by a bronz eagle with a spread of six feet. There are engraved on the monument 132 names of soldier dead. The stone is of granite and is a very handsome memorial.


