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DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES

Result of the City Convention This Afternoon.

I. G. WESTERVELT FOR MAYOR.

A. J. Koenigstein is Nominated for City Clerk, John Friday for Treasurer, A. P. Childs for Police Judge, and Matrau and Dean for Members of School Board.

The democratic city convention was held at the city hall this afternoon. At 2 o'clock the convention was called to order by D. J. Koenigstein, chairman of the central committee. Temporary organization was effected by the election of G. A. Luikart chairman and J. L. Daniel secretary.

On motion a committee of three was appointed on credentials, consisting of D. J. Koenigstein, F. W. Koerber and H. C. Matrau.

The convention took a short recess, while the committee was receiving credentials. The committee reported that the following named delegates were entitled to seats in the convention: First ward: C. E. W. Marquardt, J. H. Conley, Paul Friebe, J. L. Daniels, Fred Degner, Fred Brummond, I. G. Westervelt, Ludwig Wetzell, C. H. Krahu.

Second ward: R. Kilmurry, A. J. Brummond, Wm. Ahlmann, M. J. Stone, Al Degner, H. C. Matrau, Fred Leu, Wm. G. Berner, Carl Wilde, M. J. Stafford.

Third ward: Peter Stafford, A. P. Childs, G. A. Luikart, D. J. Koenigstein, S. G. Dean, Albert Wilde, Dr. A. Bear, A. J. Koenigstein, A. P. O'Banion and J. C. Stitt.

Fourth ward: Fred Koerber, O. A. Harschman, Steve Burnett, Tom Shively, L. H. Breed and A. Viergutz.

The temporary organization was made permanent, and the chair stated that the nomination of a candidate for mayor was in order.

The name of I. G. Westervelt was proposed by D. J. Koenigstein, and there being no other nominations the nomination of Mr. Westervelt was made by acclamation. The nominee in response to calls for a speech, said that if elected he would "do the best he can under existing circumstances—I can't help existing circumstances."

John Friday was nominated for city treasurer by acclamation.

No nomination was made for the office of city engineer.

For the office of police judge, P. O. Hirsch and A. P. Childs were placed in nomination.

Messrs. Al. Degner and C. F. W. Marquardt were appointed as tellers.

The ballot being taken resulted: P. O. Hirsch 15, A. P. Childs 15.

Another ballot was taken which gave Childs 16, Hirsch 13, J. L. Daniel 1, and Mr. Childs was declared the nominee.

For city clerk A. J. Koenigstein and Alfred Gerecke were placed in nomination. The ballot resulted: Koenigstein 20; Gerecke 11. The chair declared Koenigstein the candidate for city clerk.

For members of the board of education, H. C. Matrau and S. G. Dean were nominated by acclamation.

The central committee was empowered by motion to fill any vacancies that may occur.

The city central committee was formed as follows:

First ward—C. F. W. Marquardt. Second ward—Albert Degner. Third ward—P. Stafford. Fourth ward—F. W. Koerber.

D. J. Koenigstein was elected chairman of the central committee and C. F. W. Marquardt was chosen secretary.

CAUGHT A SHOP-LIFTER.

W. H. Woodworth Detects a Fellow in the Act of Appropriating Some Clothing.

This morning between 7 and 8 o'clock, as W. H. Woodworth and J. F. Redman, clerks in the store of A. G. Bohner, were sweeping out, a fellow entered and ordered a quarter's worth of eggs. Mr. Woodworth went into the back room to get the eggs and in the meantime kept an eye on his customer through a peep hole in the partition.

The fellow walked along until he came to the clothing counter and while there neatly slipped two pairs of pants and a vest under his coat. Mr. Woodworth viewing the entire transaction. He paid for the eggs and started out. Mr. Woodworth then informed Mr. Redman what had occurred and followed the thief out of the building and as he started down Fifth street he was nabbed by Woodworth and taken to the store where he was detained until Chief of Police Widaman arrived and escorted him to jail.

The goods were found on his person and an hour or two after his arrest he was brought before Police Judge Hayes and arraigned on the charge of petty larceny, the value of the goods being placed at between \$10 and \$12. The fellow gave his name as C. W. Willis, but admitted that it was not his real name. He pleaded guilty to the charge of stealing the clothes and was sent to the county jail for a term of 30 days. He will be taken this evening by Chief Widaman and turned over to the care of Sheriff Losey.

It is suspected that he is a member of a gang who make such transactions a business, but there appears to be no way of proving anything against others who are suspected.

Goods had been disappearing from the store for some time which was the cause of close watch being kept. The fellow arrested had been suspected of having a hand in the matter and that he was neatly caught goes without question.

It was at first believed that someone had a skeleton key in their possession but it is likely that the goods were removed in the manner attempted this morning.
