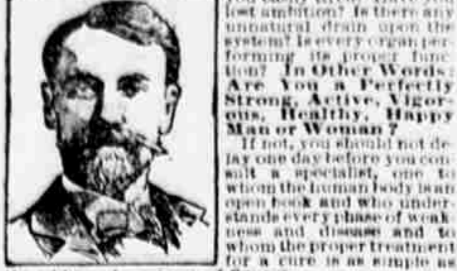

POWERS TAKE A HAND

Troops Landed in China From Foreign Warships.

BRITISH LANDING AT SHANGHAI

Boxers Becoming More Merciless in Their Slaughter of Christians—Three Families Massacred Near Peking—News Constantly Arriving of Fresh Atrocities.

SHANGHAI, May 31.—The British warships Orlando and Algerine are landing 100 men at Taku, where the French, Russian and Japanese guards have already disembarked.

The Boxers are apparently without arms, except those they have obtained from the soldiery, many of whom are openly joining the rebels.

PEKIN, May 31.—From all parts of the surrounding country news is constantly arriving of fresh atrocities committed by the Boxers. Three Christian families were massacred at Shan Lai Ying, 60 miles from Peking, May 25. Only two escaped.

A representative of the Associated Press visited Fang Tai and found the place occupied by a battalion of troops. The whole railroad station, workshops and locomotive sheds were gutted and much rolling stock was destroyed. The neighboring villagers seem to have joined in the attack, showing that the movement is not confined to the Boxers. Eight rioters who were captured will be decapitated.

The situation is somewhat better, the troops having occupied all disturbed localities. The party rescued at Chang Tsin defended themselves from a house and fired on the Boxers, killing several. When the troops of the relieving party arrived the house was abandoned and the soldiers looted and burned it. Two men and one woman are unaccounted for. It is feared they are in the hands of the Boxers.

Heavy Fighting in China.

LONDON, May 31.—The Daily Mail has received the following from Tien Tsin, dated May 30: "Heavy fighting has taken place between the Imperial troops and the Boxers at Lau Hi Shin Hi Sien, but the result is not known here. Railway traffic at Peking has been resumed. The foreign settlement here is sufficiently protected by the American and Japanese troops who have been landed. Consequently the excitement has abated."

PEACE ON FIELD OF BATTLE.

Maryland Dedicates a Monument at Antietam.

HAGERSTOWN, May 31.—At Antietam battlefield where they fought each other's lives 38 years ago, the men who wore the blue and the men who wore the gray met yesterday in good fellowship and brotherhood.

As friends who have forgotten and forgiven, as citizens of one nation and followers of one flag, they shook hands and forged a new link in the great chain which binds the north and south. The scene on Antietam battlefield, as the monument was formally handed over by the representative of the people of Maryland to the representative of the entire people of the United States, was one which should become historic. It marked an epoch in the life of the American republic.

The train which brought the president, the members of his cabinet and the congressional party from Washington reached the battlefield at noon, where they were welcomed by Governor John Walter Smith of Maryland and staff.

Boer Envoys at Boston. BOSTON, May 31.—The envoys from the South African republics paid a tribute to the soldiers of this republic soon after their arrival from New York yesterday by placing a wreath on the soldiers' monument on Boston common. The envoys were escorted by members of the joint commission of the city government who had met them at Providence. Taking carriages all were driven directly to the Boston common, the streets through which they passed being lined with cheering people.

Confederate Reunion Opens. LOUISVILLE, May 31.—Surrounded by waving banners bearing the fiery cross of the confederacy, listening to the cheers from the throats of 3,000 men who wore the gray and confronted by the waving handkerchiefs of hundreds of ladies, General John B. Gordon, commander of the United Confederate Veterans, yesterday formally opened the 10th annual reunion of the order, which in point of attendance is the largest ever held since the inception of the organization.

Memorial Day Exercises at New York. NEW YORK, May 31.—The Memorial day exercises of the Grand Army of the Republic were held at the Metropolitan opera house last night. Senator Dewey presided. The oration was delivered by ex-Senator Hill. Senator Dewey spoke of the death of the old bitterness between the north and the south and of the general observance by all sections of the beautiful services of Memorial day.

Sudden Seize at Kearney. KEARNEY, Neb., May 31.—All memorial exercises were postponed here yesterday on account of a smallpox scare, which had the effect of keeping the residents close to their homes. The smallpox is at present confined to the First ward, where the families of several railway laborers are afflicted.

Oris Arrives at San Francisco. SAN FRANCISCO, May 31.—The transport Meade arrived from Manila last night with Major General E. S. Oris aboard. As the transport entered the harbor a salute of 13 guns was fired and a number of gaily decorated tugs and launches went out to meet her.

New War Minister Takes Charge. PARIS, May 31.—The premier, M. Waldeck-Rousseau, conducted General Andre, the new minister of war, to the Elysee palace yesterday to present him to President Loubet. On leaving the palace General Andre proceeded to the war office and took charge of affairs there.

MUD VOLCANOES ACTIVE.

Cause Great Alarm Among the People Who Live in the Vicinity. LAYTONVILLE, Cal., May 31.—The mud volcanoes situated in this vicinity have burst into alarming activity. The first intimation the inhabitants had of the phenomenon was when an immense cloud of vapor issued from the mouth of the crater, accompanied by a sound like faraway thunder. The disturbance is so violent that great redwood trees are swayed when the mud and vapor shoots high over the rims of the craters and flows down the hillside like a lava stream into one of the tributaries of the Eel river.

The murky craters are filled with a bluish mud of about the consistency of boiling tar, but the mud is icy cold. The roar of the volcanoes can be heard for miles around. They are situated 20 miles from the ocean and consist of a number of mounds about six feet high.

Strike Off at Kansas City. KANSAS CITY, May 31.—The strike of the union street railway employees in Kansas City has been called off. At a meeting of the strikers a committee was appointed to wait upon President Holmes of the Metropolitan company and offer to declare the strike off on condition that the strikers be taken back. President Holmes declined to consider this proposition and later the strike was declared off, leaving the men free to secure reinstatement upon individual application.

Drastic Measures to Collect a Fee. CHICAGO, May 31.—Dr. Benjamin Thomas of Tama, Ia., followed the body of young George Borget from Tama to Chicago and refused to deliver it to the dead boy's mother until he was paid a bill of \$58 for two hours' medical attendance. He finally compromised on \$30. The boy was run over by a Northwestern train at Tama, Ia., on Thursday night and died early Friday morning.

Situation in St. Louis. ST. LOUIS, May 31.—All the pent-up fury of the striking employees of the St. Louis Transit company and their sympathizers seems to have been expended, for Tuesday's violent demonstrations and scenes of bloodshed were followed yesterday by a pronounced lull. Only one name has been added to the long casualty list, that of Anton Chalupsky, who was shot in the legs by a policeman.

Salem Bank Vault Cracked. SALEM, Neb., May 31.—Burglars broke into the Bank of Salem at an early yesterday morning by cutting out a window light in the rear. They then put a charge of powder into the back part of the brick vault, the explosion of which awoke persons nearby, who gave the alarm and chased the would-be robbers away before any booty had been secured.

Omaha Inventor Drops Dead. NEW YORK, May 31.—After working 25 years to complete a gold refining machine, Samuel W. Walker, an inventor of Omaha, was stricken with heart disease in Brooklyn and died yesterday, aged 48 years.
