Chinch Bug Inoculation.

The Nebraka agricultural experiment station for three years furnished inoculated chinch bugs for the purpose of return until Sept. 1st. ascertaining whether or not this methed of fighting the insect was practical. It was learned during this time that, where instructions were followed faithfully and climatic conditions were favorable, the disease worked well. On the other hand, where conditions were unfavorable and instructions only in part or not at all complied with, the results

were almost invariably negative. Since no supply of the infection can be obtained from private sources by our farmers, the pressure has been so great recently for a continuation of this work here that the University has concluded to send out a limited supply of the fungus to those who are sufficiently interested in it to give it a fair trial. It can be obtained by writing to the Department of Entomology, university of Nebraska, Lincoln
