New Foundry Started.

John Cronk, of the Novelty, Iron and Brass works, made his first cast of metal this forenoon at his foundry near the old Daniel home on East Main street. The cast was a success in every way and consisted of 1000 pounds of grates for threshing engines besides about 400 pounds of miscellaneous castings among which was iron work for one of the laundry machines.

The Novelty Iron and Brass works is well fitted for any work in its line. The old Olney barn has been converted into a foundry of most convenient and handy proportions.

The lower room is fitted for the casting operation and there is, also machinery for finishing the work produced. The cupola is well built and has a good large capacity. A steam engine furnishes power to operate the blower and other machinery.

Upstairs is the pattern room and tools and appliances for doing the necessary woodwork. Outside of the building is a quantity of machinery that indicates an abundance of work, in fact Mr. Cronk states that he has four weeks' work ahead.

His force of helpers is not large at present but will be increased if he finds himself unable to catch up with orders.

Besides doing foundry and machine work Mr. Cronk hopes to supply his patrons with repairs and material outside of his line, such as belts, hose, etc.

While not entirely arranged as yet, Mr. Cronk is able to handle all ordinary work and hopes to soon be in shape so that no work in his line need be refused.

He is a competent, painstaking workman and will undoubtedly build up a good business.

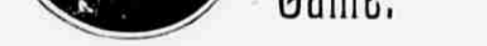
