JESTER IS A FREE MAN.

Jury Finds Him Guiltless of the Murder of Gilbert Gates.

New London, Mo., Aug. 2.—Alexander Jester, the octogenarian who had been on trial here for the past two weeks for the murder 29 years ago of Gilbert Gates, was last night acquitted.

When the jury filed into the court room it was filled with an expectant throng. Judge Erby promptly asked the foreman of the jury, Joseph Barry, if they had come to a conclusion.

"We, the jury, find the defendant, Alexander Jester, not guilty."

The old prisoner, bent with age and worn with watching, sat as if dazed for an instant while the audience, at first too amazed to realize that the trial had so quickly come to an end, watched the actions of the judge in breathless silence.

The first ballot stood nine for acquittal and three for murder in the first degree. The next stood ten for acquittal and two for conviction.

As soon as Jester could tear himself away from those who crowded about to congratulate him, he hurried to his hotel and was soon the center of a happy group, made up of his children, Harvey Jester, Will and Alice Hill, who quietly rejoiced.

When the verdict was made known it caused general rejoicing throughout the town.
