To be sure, in this calculation no allowance is made for losses by disease, accident or otherwise, but cattle in VIOLENT shocks of an earthquake this country are remarkably healthy and a friend of ours who has kept note for nine years, (the progeny of one cow) says he has lost but three calves in that time. The problem to which Mr. Barnum gives answer is this: What will be the increase from one cow (with calf beside her) supposing that all steer calves are exchanged for heifers, and that the heifers begin to bear at the age of two years.
