

Antiquarian Cave in Ohio.

The Ohio Valley, and this immediate section in particular, is rich in remains of that wonderful prehistoric race, the evidences of whose civilization have been perpetuated in those curious pieces of engineering from which is derived the euphonious name "Mound Builders," given them by archaeologists.

On this couch is extended the figure of a man. It is probably of life size, and measures nine feet four inches in length. The limbs are finely proportioned and disposed in an easy and graceful manner. The arms are folded across the breast and the fingers clasp a bunch of leaves resembling oak, reproduced with such fidelity to nature that it looks like petrifications.

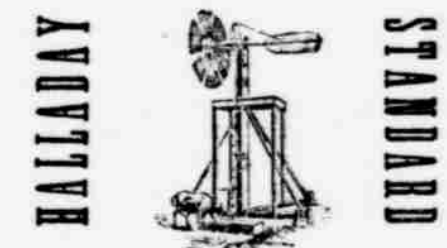

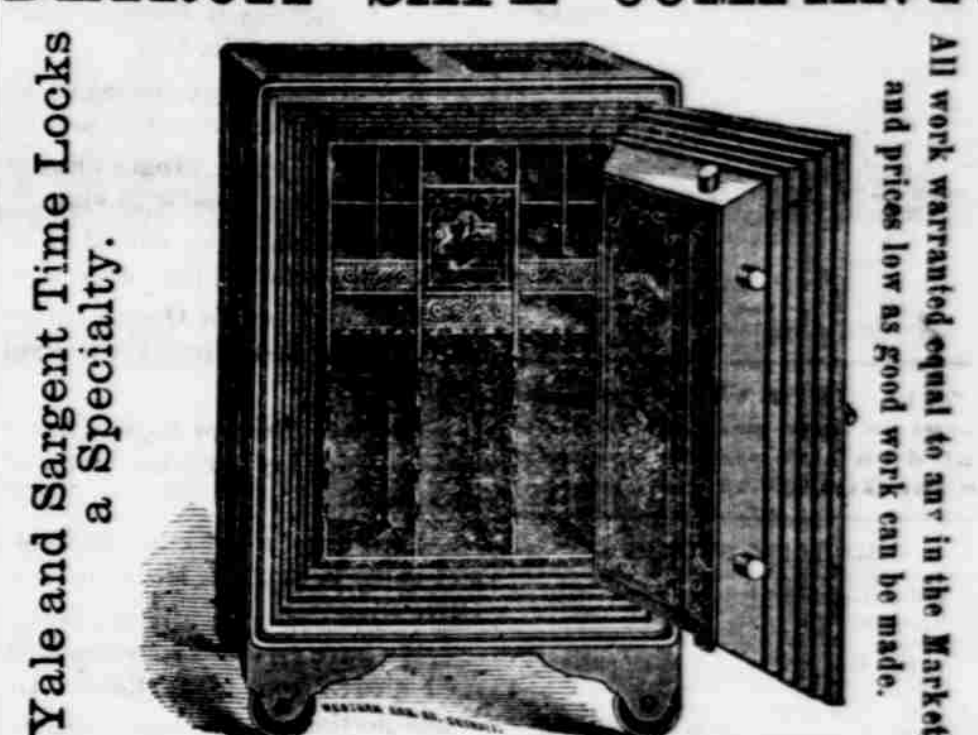
