THE LOUP BREAK.

Damage to Bridges, Roads, Houses, Etc., Etc.

Some Incidents of the Hour.

On Saturday last the long-looked for break-up of the Loup river took place, making considerable havoc of Albion were in the city Monday. There has been no such flood water and ice since 1867, when the waters covered the bottom south of this city. All was excitement, and in a few minutes most of the people in town were upon the streets, house-tops, etc., looking at the re morseless waters covered with ice pushing everything before them. At a little after noon the water and ice filled and overflowed the bed of the river, and in a very few minutes the flats, reaching from the "Bench' south of 11th street, to the regular bed of the river, were covered with water and ice, in some places moving swiftly-others slowly, according to the lay of the land. Some of those who remember the overflow of '67, say it was higher than this, others say not. There being more houses in the bottom now, the damage will, of course, be very much

There was abundance of ice upwards of two feet in thickness, and Charles Matthews saw one piece which by actual measurement was three feet and two inches thick. As we write, the river bank can be seen strewn thick with great cakes

Of course we shall not be able to glean all particulars of damages into this brief account, but we give the main items coming within our knowledge.

Early in the flood the middle spans of the Loup river wagon bridge were seen to loosen and quietly float down stream. Holding together for a few rods, they finally began to waver and were borne under. 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
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
