MAINE'S VOTE STILL RISING. A Heavy Blow Against Brigadier Blaine. The Compliments of Blaine's Neighbors to Blaine's Malingerers. The result of the Maine election gives the Republican candidate for governor 16,000 plurality and elects all the republican congressmen. For the state senate none but republicans have been returned, while in the house but two democrats will have seats. Two-thirds of the Irish-Americans in the state voted for the republican candidates, and is considered as significant of the result of the National election.
