A Model Farm.

Thursday last, for the first time in several years we visited Hon. Guy C. Barnum's farm south of the city, and between the Loup and Platte rivers. As is well known to most of the older settlers here, Mr. Barnum has one of the best locations for mixed farming and stock-raising that there is in the state. There is nothing more admirable than a good farm in Nebraska, and this is surely one of them. A rich, sandy loam, the land has been well tilled for years (but never better, we believe, than this season and last by Geo. E., son of the proprietor), and everything showing that though large crops may have been taken from the soil. year after year, the fertility has been well preserved, because this has been a place for preparing cattle and hoge for market, as well as raising grain to feed them, and the "tarmer's bank" has been made to do full duty, as can readily be seen by the clean etc. They take their camp equipages corrals and the thrifty crops.

While there is much anxiety in - David Anderson of this city, other states regarding the dry weather, and even among Nebraskans, here and there, a little uneesiness as to results, we have seen in this region but little, as yet, to dishearten the husbandman. 
