PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, A JOINT RESOLUTION the State of Nebraska, at the Nineteenth Session thereof, and approved March 5th A. D. 1885, proposing an amendment to Section four (4) of Article three (3) of the Constitution of said State and that said section as amended, shall read as follows, to-wit:

"SECTION 4. The term of office of mem bers of the Legislature shall be two years, and they shall each receive pay at the rate of five dollars per day during their sitting, and ten cents for every mile they shall travel in going to and returning from the place of meeting of the Legislature, on the most usual route; Provided, however, That they shall no receive pay for more than sixty days at any one sitting, nor more than one hundred days during their term; that neither members of the Legislature nor employes shall receive any pay or mileage. Each session, except special sessions, shall be not less than sixty days; after the expiration of forty days of the session no bills nor joint resolu tions of the nature of bills shall be introduced, unless the Governor shall by special message call the attention of the Legislature to the necessity of passing :

law on the subject matter embraced in the message, and the introduction of bills shall be restricted thereto; Provided. The ballots at said election shall be in the following form: "For proposed Amendment to the Constitution relating to the Legislative De-'Against proposed Amend-

ment to the Constitution relating to the Letislative Department,' Therefore, 1, James W. Dawes, Gov. ernor of the State of Nebraska, do hereby give notice in accordance with Section one (1), Article fifteen (15) of the Con stitution, and the provisions of an act entitled "An act to provide the manner of proposing amendments to the Constitution and submitting the same to the electors of the State," approved Feb ruary 13th, A.
