GOOD ENOUGH. —The Packing House to be Opened. —For quite a while the Columbus Packing House has been closed to business.

—The oldest inhabitants do not remember so severe a storm this early in the season, and the last one in this region to which it may fitly be likened was that of mid-April, 1873.

—But for a few instances of bunches of cattle driven before the wind into exposed places, where they perished; hogs smothered in the snow; sheep crowded in close quarters; sheep piled together, etc., there was little loss—all put together, of every kind, the percentage is small.
