## GEN. SHERMAN IS DEAD

### PEACEFUL END OF A HEROIC CAREER.

The Conqueror was Conquered at His Home in New York Saturday Afternoon. A Sketch of His Life and Services to the Nation—Public Servant, General and Statesman.

New York, Feb. 24.—Special Bulletin: Sherman is dead. At 1.30 p. m. a servant came out of the house and said that the general was dead. The news was confirmed by the doctor who had been summoned from the city. The general had been suffering from a long illness and his death was a relief to his family and friends.

### THE MORNING BULLETIN.

The General's Condition Considered Dangerous from an Early Hour To-Day.

New York, Feb. 24.—Senator Sherman at 4.30 this morning sent the following message to the President: "I have the honor to inform you of the death of General Sherman, who passed away peacefully at his home in New York City at 1.30 p. m. this afternoon. His death is a great loss to the nation."
