THEIR DOORS CLOSED.

BANKS IN CHICAGO AND INDIANAPOLIS COLLAPSE. The Columbia of the World's Fair City Posts Notices Announcing Suspension.

CHICAGO, May 12.—The Columbian National bank of this city failed yesterday. It had a capital of \$1,000,000 and deposits of \$1,400,000.

It is said that the cause of the failure was poor collections on loans. This collapse and that at Indianapolis caused a break of 2 1/2 cents in the price of wheat here.

Notices announcing the suspension were posted on the doors and soon afterwards the banks in Chicago and Indianapolis closed.

President Dwiggen assigns the immediate cause of the failure to the suit against the Chicago National bank, which failed a few days ago.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 12.—The Capital National bank of this city has suspended and a bank examiner is in charge.

The officials of the bank made a statement in which they say the capital was \$1,000,000 and deposits \$1,400,000.
