A Good Fertilizer.

A very cheap and easy way to pre pare bones to supply as fertilizer is by the use of ashes. Break the bones as small as possible. Then cover the bottom of a barrel or box with a few inches of ashes, then put in a layer of bones, and so on until the receptacle is filled. The time required for the decomposition of the bones depends upon the strength of the ashes, the size of the bones, and the amount of moisture in the mixture. The mixture should be made quite damp by pouring water on it, but not enough water should be used as to cause it to drain. Hardwood ashes which have not been exposed to the weather are best for reducing
