SWEPT INTO THE SEA.

CAPITAL OF LOWER CALIFORNIA PARTLY DESTROYED.

Wind and Wave Creates Havoc Along the Mexican Coast—Great Damage to Shipping—Four Lives Lost and Twenty-two Persons Injured.

QUAYHAR, Mex., Oct. 11.—In the hurricane which swept over Lapaz, 164 houses were destroyed, four lives lost and about 21 persons were wounded.

Many residences of the American colony were destroyed and the remainder were more or less damaged.

CAUGHT LIKE RATS IN A TRAP IN A MINE SHAFT.
