"It shall be the duty of every person wning or keeping swine upon his premises in which an ontbreak of any contagious or infectious disease may occur, to immediately quarantine said premises by posting and keeping so posted during the continuance of said sickness or plague at least three placards not less than twenty-four inches in length and fifteen inches in width bearing the name of the supposed disease, one of which placards shall be posted at the entrance to said premises and the other two in the most conspicuous place thereon. It shall be unlawful for any person to remove or to allow to be removed from animals but that all dead animals shall within twenty-four hours be the week ending August 28, 1897. burned or buried upon the premises.
