Death of A. J. Campbell.

Andrew J. Campbell, well known to nany Journal readers, died Saturday norning last at 9 o'clock of Bright's disease, at the residence of David Mowery, He had been ailing for some time, but only on Wednesday evening preceding his death, did he succumb to the inevitable. He had a sinking spell Thursday evening, and was even down town for a little while Friday evening. Mr. Campbell came to Platte county, locating at Humphrey, in 1882, where he lived several years, coming to Columbus with ex-Sheriff Caldwell and working for him as deputy sheriff, afterwards holding same position with ex-Sheriff Kavanaugh.
