Growing Trade With Germany. The better relations established between Germany and the United States through the efforts of Baron von Bulow and Embassador White have resulted in a gratifying increase in trade. An official comparative statement of the ten months of this year with the same months of last year shows a net increase in our exports to Germany of \$27,000,000 and in our imports from Germany of \$8,000,000. The balance is decidedly on the American side, but Germany has no cause to complain thereat. What it has imported from the United States has been bought more cheaply than it could have been had in any other country, while it has had its price for the additional \$8,000,000 worth of goods sold in this country.
