Ex-Mayor August Boettcher and Dr. Berthold Tiesing will start from Columbus tomorrow morning over the Union Pacific on their European trip. They will go direct to New York. From there they will go to New Haven, Conn., where Dr. Tiesing was a student for a while in Yale University. They will return from there to New York from which city they will sail one week from next Saturday. Three months is the time limit set for their trip, which will take them through the most interesting places in Europe.

They expect to land first at Naples. Their itinerary from there, subject to few possible changes, will take them to Rome, Florence, Venice and Milan. Then follows a complete tour of Switzerland. Thence they will go to Vienna and Munich and from there north to Dr. Tiesing's old University town, Jena, where the doctor will attend the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Natural Science club of which he is a member. Berlin is also on their program from which place they will go north to visit friends of Mr. Boettcher.

Every detail from the passport to the tooth brush has been arranged and these two estimable Columbus citizens are starting out with every assurance of a journey full of pleasure and educational advantages.

Journal readers are promised the interesting pages from the diary of the travelers from time to time. Dr. W. R. Cornelius will occupy Dr. Tiesing's office during the latter's absence.
