For ruffing the dignity of the village marshall and fracturing the law of the commonwealth of Nebraska by looking upon the wise when it was red and for lingering too long at the flowing bowl, another ruralist was arrested Tuesday on complaint of the police department and taken before Judge Bratt. The defendant pleaded guilty to the charge of intoxication and was fined \$5 and costs.  
Henry Kretz was arrested Tuesday by Sheriff Babb on a complaint sworn out by Dr. W. H. Winslow superintendent of the government school, charging him with having sold liquor to a minor, a pupil at the school.  
Kretz was taken to Fullerton in the afternoon, and in Judge Robinson's court asked that his hearing be set for June 12th, which request was granted.

The defendant's bond was placed at \$100, which was furnished by William Brown.  
Memorial Sunday and Decoration day were observed in Genoa in the usual patriotic manner. The memorial services were held at the opera house in the morning. Rev. W. J. Briant delivered an address befitting the occasion. On Decoration day the procession formed but did not march to the cemetery as had been planned, on account of the muddy condition of the road occasioned by the heavy rain the day previous. About ten o'clock the male pupils from the Indian school marched on Willard avenue and halted at the street running south to the depot, where they remained until the procession started for the cemetery, and then returned to the school. For half an hour before the start for the cemetery was made, the Indian School Band, Genoa Band and Wiggins' Drum Corps entertained the gathering crowd. The graves of fourteen departed veterans who rest in the Genoa cemetery were covered with flowers by the school children. In the afternoon exercises were held in the opera house, where the program, as published in the Times last week, was rendered.
