The birds are doing unusually well, as several coveys of almost full grown birds have been seen. The birds on Buck Island seem to have been the most successful—one covey there containing twenty or more young birds. The association desires to again call attention to the fact that these birds are being watched very closely, and they hope that all sportemen, whether members of the club or not, will assist them in protecting these birds. Any violation of the law will be vigorously prosecuted. It is more than likely that the next birds to be liberated will be Hungarian partridges.
