Dr. Mathews was charged with a criminal operation and after a hearing his license to practice medicine was ordered revoked by the State Board of Health. This decision was sustained by the district court of Lancaster county and Dr. Mathews then appealed to the supreme court.

As Presidential Elector.

Secretary of State Junkin has received an opinion from Attorney General Thompson bearing on the protest against the placing of the name of Neble on the primary ballot as candidate for presidential elector in the Second congressional district as a democrat and populist. The secretary of state will give an opinion soon. The opinion of the attorney general holds that no candidate has the right to place on the primary ballot unless the party he represents cast one per cent of the vote in the congressional district and that one elector is to be nominated in each congressional district.

Grand Assessment Roll. The grand assessment roll of Nebraska as fixed by the State Board of Equalization is \$392,167,814.60. Last year Nebraska property was assersed at \$329,413,349.32. This is an increase of \$62,754,465.28. The assessment is one-fifth of the actual value. There will be some change in the total given for this year and it will be slightly
