OPPOSED BY BARTON

STATE AUDITOR AGAINST SELL ING OF INSURANCE STOCK.

WILL ASK FOR LEGISLATION

Adjutant General Issues Orders in Reference to State Guard.—Capital Matters in General.

State Auditor Barton is opposed to nsurance companies selling stock through agents whose pay is taken out of the money paid for the stock. Along the same line he will ask for legislation making it illegal for any insurance company to transact business in Nebraska whose capital stock has not been fully paid up and to prohibit any insurance company hereafter formed to do business in the state if the cost of its organization and stock gales has exceeded 5 per cent of the total sum contributed by the stockholders.

The state auditor believes the practice of insurance companies putting stock salesmen out on the road selling stock and paying these salesmen out of the money they secure from the stockholders is not only bad practice, but augurs well for someone to lose money. For that reason he intends to fight the practice if such is the practice in Nebraska, and he warns the people against buying stock in such companies.

This question was taken up at the meeting of the insurance commissioners from many states and a resolution was adopted asking all the states to enact legislation along the lines above set out.

It was brought out at that meeting that from 20 to 30 per cent of the stock on the market and that per cent, therefore, of the capital stock never reached the treasury of the company.


