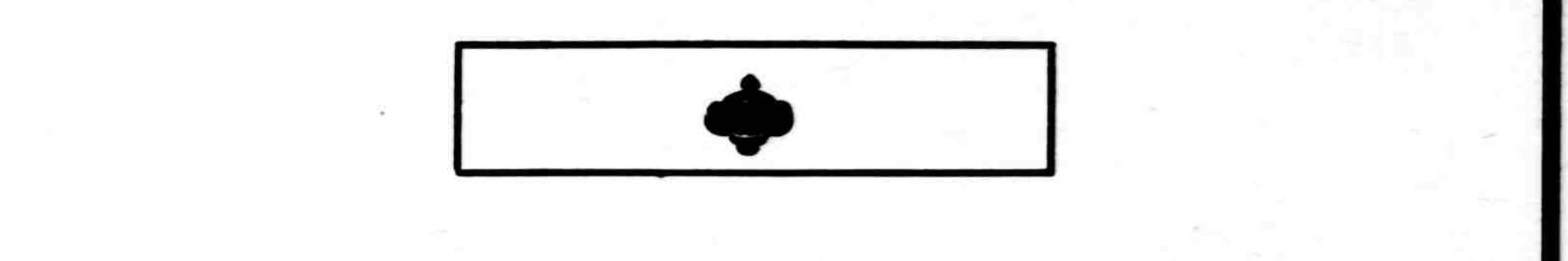
Call for the Republican County Convention.

The republican electors of Platte county, Nebraska, are hereby called to meet in a delegate convention in the city of Columbus, in Gilman's hall, in the North opera house, on Monday, the 24th day of July, at 2 o'clock, p. m. for the purpose of electing eleven delegates to the state convention to be held in the city of Lincoln, Nebraska on the 25th day of July, 1911, and to elect a central committee, and transfer such other business as may publicly come before the convention.

It is recommended that primaries be held in the several townships and wards on Saturday, July 22, 1911, for the purpose of electing delegates to said county convention; said primaries to be held at an hour designated by the township or ward committee.

The basis of representation for delegates to said convention shall be one delegate at large, and one delegate for every fifteen (15) votes, for major fraction cast for Senator Elmer J. Burkett for preference for United States senator at the last general election.

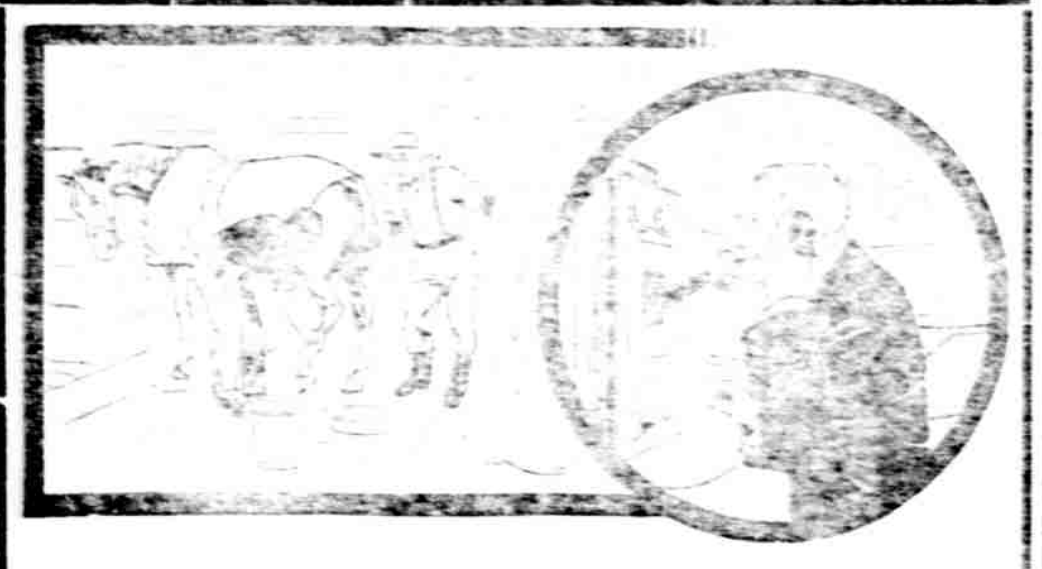
